# NURSERY

What a fantastic, busy half term we have had in Nursery. We can't believe we are half way through the school year already! We have welcomed seven new friends to our class this half term, they have settled so well and the children have made them feel really welcome.

We had lots of fun learning about Chinese New Year. We made shape dragons and paper plate rabbits, made our own dragon and performed our own dragon dance and even had a go with chop sticks!

Our current topic 'People Who Help Us' is proving to be a big hit! We have shared lots of books about the professions of people who help us including 'Charlie the firefighter', made our own fire helmets and put out 'fire' with water, dressed up as postal workers and sorted the mail in the sorting office and played in our doctors role play area. 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## English

This half term we have used the story of George and The Dragon by Chris Wormell as a stimulus for our writing. The children learned how to create an atmospheric setting, describe characters in detail, and how to add dialogue to make a story appealing to the reader.

#### Maths

In maths we have practised a range of strategies for adding and subtracting within 20. First of all we practised our number pairs to 10 as this underpins lots of mental maths strategies. We then learned how to count on and back using a number line and compare totals to find which was more/less.

#### Science

We have learned so much about Space this half term, particularly about astronauts and the important role they play in developing our future. We completed a timeline of important events in space which included significant women and people of colour. Ask anyone in Year 1 about Valentina Tereshkova, Helen Sharman and Mae Jemison!! Or ask them "Who were Laika and Albert?" You will be impressed with their knowledge.


## History

In History we learned about Kings and Queens from Victoria to the present day. We placed them on a timeline and learned the difference between the monarch and the prime minister in terms if who has the most power and how to they receive it.

#### Geography

In Geography we learned about the difference between aerial views, maps and plans and when we might choose each one to show the location of a place or object. We looked at an aerial view of the school, a map of the local area, and a plan of a child's bedroom. Reading is always high on our agenda and it is clear that those children who read regularly benefit in many ways. They build a wider vocabulary, are able to compose stories of their own and are much better at spelling irregular words. Please make sure that you read with your child at least three times a week and record it on the Boomreader app. Don't forget to read a story to your child yourself at bedtime too! You are the best model and its such a lovely way to end a busy day. Well done to those parents who manage this, despite their busy schedule.

What a jam packed half term we have had! The children returned after the Christmas break so grown up and determined to learn. It has been a pleasure to see.



In Music, the children have explored Victorian songs and games as well as learning to use the xylophone.

# Veel 5





# **CHARTERS** FROM THE IGHTHOUSE

Our theme this half term has been Heritage and Culture. The children have investigated World War 2 and what life was like during this era. We have explored the book 'Letters from the Lighthouse' by Emma Carroll. The book is centred around two siblings who are evacuated to the Devonshire coast to escape German bombs. The children wrote formal letters persuading parents of WW2 children to evacuate their children immediately. It has been incredible to see the effort they have put in and the quality of their work.

In geography, we have used maps to compare Britain in the pre-industrial and postindustrial age. The topic was further extended to our music lessons where we looked at how different groups of people experienced music in the 1700s – 1900s.

The progress the children have made in maths is phenomenal. Recently, they have been working on position and direction. They have developed their knowledge of coordinates and the four quadrants and applied this to reasoning and problems solving

questions.

In other areas of the curriculum, our science lessons have been based on evolution and inheritance. The children began by exploring the work of Charles Darwin and how he developed the theory of evolution. We then went on to look at characteristics that are inherited from our parents and those that are acquired. What a fantastic start to the new year! Well done Year 6.
